When Amber needed a reliable vehicle to get to work and care for her son Cooper, she found herself stuck. With a low credit score, her only lending options came with sky-high interest rates—often 28% or more—and hidden fees she couldn't afford.

That's where Lacasa's Auto Loan Program comes in.

This new initiative helps working individuals in Elkhart County with low or no credit access fair, affordable vehicle financing. Participants also receive one-on-one financial coaching to build long-term stability—not just make a purchase.

Amber and Cooper became the program's very first success story. Thanks to a fixed-rate loan made possible by Lacasa and Interra Credit Union, they now have a dependable vehicle—and the freedom that comes with it.

For many in our community, a car isn't a luxury. It's a lifeline.

With your support, Lacasa is creating real alternatives to predatory lending and giving families the tools to move forward—safely, confidently, and with dignity.

Right now in Goshen, Lacasa is hard at work on Lakeview Drive, our newest affordable and supportive housing development. When complete, the first phase of this project will offer 35 new rental units for individuals and families, paired with supportive services designed to help residents heal, grow, and thrive.

We expect the first building to be ready in early 2026. This work is only possible thanks to strong community partnerships. We're grateful to the City of Goshen, DJ Construction, Oaklawn Psychiatric Center, and Bashor Children's Home for believing in this project and walking along side us to provide homes for the most vulnerable in our community. This summer, we completed the renovation of a long-empty preschool building at 317 Arbor Court, a part of Arbor Ridge, transforming it into seven fully updated 1-bedroom apartments. These new apartments will provide safe, stable housing for individuals and families who need it most.

This project is a powerful example of how Lacasa continues to make the most of what already exists—revitalizing underused spaces to meet the growing need for affordable housing in our community.

With funding from the HOME Investment Partnerships



Program through the Indiana Housing & Community Development Authority, and the work of Lacasa's Real Estate Development team, a once-vacant building is now ready to welcome new residents.

From Dream to Doorstep: Nadia's Homeownership Story

Nadia is officially a homeowner—and her story is a powerful example of what's possible when trusted guidance, personal commitment, and strong community partnerships come together.

She began her journey through Lacasa's IDA Matched Savings Program, saving \$1,500 and receiving a \$4,500 match. With help from her Housing Counselor, DeVon, she also accessed \$15,000 in down payment support from the City of Goshen.

And thanks to Old National Bank and FHLBank Indianapolis, she received a \$20,000 Launch Grant—bringing her total support to over \$41,000.

"I was hesitant about buying a house. It felt like something adults do—and I'm not quite 'adulty' enough. (I'm turning 49 next month.) I didn't think I'd find something so fast. And now I'm figuring out where to hang pictures in my new place!" - Nadia, Homebuyer

With steady coaching and layered support, Nadia found a home that fits both her budget and her life.
