"I Got a Life Again..." Katyana's Master It Series Story

Lacasa's Master It Series financial education courses empower adults to manage, stabilize, and grow their finances. The free classes are taught in English or Spanish and are available in person or online. Led by financial coaches and HUD-certified housing counselors, the Master It Series provides resources for dealing with credit, debt, money, and moving toward homeownership. To date, the program has seen 387 graduates complete at least one class. Katyana is one of many who are experiencing a new level of financial freedom post graduation.

"Well, I first heard about Lacasa from the Habitat program," says Katyana. "They refer the classes to us because they want us to work on money management and home ownership."



Once classes began, Katyana felt immediate enthusiasm.

"I know how sometimes you have anxiety when it comes to finances. And I was in that place. And when I came to the class, it was a big relief for me. It really got me digging deep into my finances....It was just amazing: the support, the team, [they're] very understanding. And you're able to speak, right? You're able to just get your thoughts out. You're not judged."

Having experienced the Financial Empowerment Center for herself, Katyana encourages others to give the Master It Series classes a chance.

"I would say, do it, do it, do it. Don't be afraid....It's never too late. I've been in a place where I almost got evicted. I've been in a place [where] my car was repossessed, and I've been in a place where I just felt like I'm never going to get out of debt. Like, I literally told myself, I'm never going to get out of debt, this is going *to be my life,"* says Katyana.

But she wasn't in that place forever. After going through the Master It Series, she had a new outlook on her future.

"I got a life again to give back and to say, I'm not giving up. I'm not going to let this thing go. I'm going to move forward...

I will be debt free. I will own my own home. Me and my family are going to be successful and my children are going to have a great life because of it."

Lacasa's Master It Series is part of our Financial Empowerment Center. With the help of a recent grant partnership with KeyBank, we're expecting to more than double our impact on financial literacy and help even more individuals achieve their financial goals. ← Twelve brand-new graduates from Lacasa's Master Your Money class proudly display their certificates of completion.

Lacasa's Jail Partnership Earns "Program of the Year"

On February 1, 2023, Lacasa was awarded "Program of the Year" at the 2023 Prosperity Indiana Summit in downtown Indianapolis. This key award for supportive services recognized the Master It Series (financial classes) that Lacasa provides for both male and female inmates in the Elkhart County jail. The Master It Series was described as "a community development program that is dedicated to improving quality of life for Hoosiers."

Lacasa's Master It Series classes provide HUD-certified, financial education courses, paired with banking and credit-building opportunities. This can include free checking and savings accounts as well as credit builder



loans for those who successfully complete the coursework. Classes included in the Master It Series are Master Your Credit, Master Your Money, Master Your Debt, and Master Homeownership.

Through partnerships with local agencies and employers, the Master It Series for inmates connects Lacasa with people who would have normally been out of the organization's reach. In 2022, Lacasa's Master It Series was proud to involve collaboration between more than 25 partners to benefit nearly 200 participants. Volunteers include bankers, loan originators, realtors, and other housing and financial industry professionals.

Lacasa has been able help countless families in need over the years. Through dedicated efforts and a compassionate approach, we have helped individuals and families overcome financial struggles, secure safe and affordable housing, and navigate the complexities of the immigration system. With a commitment to strengthening the community we serve, Lacasa has become a vital resource for the community, making a real difference in the lives of those who need it most.

"Master It Series" class graduates: 384 (167 of those were incarcerated)

Community Foundation of Elkhart County Grant

The Community Foundation of Elkhart County's "Building Community in South Central Elkhart" \$100,000 grant will be invested in the South Central Elkhart neighborhood. There, we're utilizing our work at the Roosevelt Center to encourage existing community leaders and help them take on their own community project goals. We provide critical Tenant Resources to assist tenants as they move toward greater financial stability and eventually help them achieve homeownership.

Outside of the grant's specifications, we're also working in the South Central neighborhood to increase housing development activities for rental housing and homeownership, financial education and coaching, matched-savings opportunities, and first-time homebuyer development while also maximizing the Roosevelt Center gym, cafeteria, and classroom space for community benefit.



KeyBank Grant

Thanks to a \$175,000 grant awarded by KeyBank, we're aiming to expand our financial education course participation and more than double the significant financial milestones reached by working adults. Key milestones include attaining homeownership or home improvement, accessing post-secondary education, gaining reliable vehicle access, and improving creditworthiness. Further, we'll create new employer partnerships to bring financial empowerment tools to the workplace to support workforce stability.

Expanding these programs over the grant's three-year timeframe will help Lacasa reach more working adults within our communities, supporting their ability to make positive financial decisions and increasing access to inclusive, mainstream financial products and services. By removing barriers through virtual education and meetings, we have already been able to reach out to families with childcare or transportation-constraints.

While our Financial Empowerment programs are available to everyone, 93% of those we serve live below 80% of the area's median income. By helping individuals become stable homeowners in the short term, we're able to increase the long term stability of individuals, families, and neighborhoods for generations.

Because Lacasa is a chartered member of NeighborWorks America, we have the opportunity to attend the annual, invitation-only, Community Leadership Institute (CLI). This is a collaboration of community leaders from across the U.S. and Puerto Rico who attend in small teams and attend a full range of courses. Leaders get to skill build, network, and hear from others on how they are solving issues in their neighborhoods. Each participating team also creates an action plan for making positive change in their neighborhoods.

This year, Lacasa staff and resident leaders from Elkhart's South-Central neighborhood attended the CLI in North Carolina and continued work outlined in the South-Central Complete Neighborhood Visioning Report. The uniqueness of this report is that it starts from a place of strength, rather than focusing on what is lacking. This neighborhood impact project focuses on the assets of the neighborhood to then be able to build and define visions and priorities.

Prairie Creek Run Highlighted at Regional Conference

Lacasa's work in the Prairie Creek Run neighborhood dates back to the 90s, but a partnership was recently developed with the Elkhart County Planning Dept., a private urban planner consultant, and residents of the neighborhood to develop a neighborhood redevelopment plan. A proposal was submitted to the OKI (Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana) Planning Conference to talk about what made this so successful. Out of 50 proposals and only 28 session slots at the conference, Lacasa's, "Three-Fold Accountability: Resident-First Planning Guided by Intentional Leadership Collaboration," was chosen. One of the core strengths of this plan was the engaged leaders and the leadership development support that Lacasa was able to provide. This support helped residents be a part of the planning processes, which led to ownership and pride of the plan and accountability to partners to accomplish the goals.
